The Department of Computer Science at The University of York is to host the 3rd International York Doctoral Symposium on Computing (YDS 2010) on the 4th November this year. The goal of the symposium is to bring together doctoral students from around the world to share and exchange their research and ideas with others. The hope is that by bringing students together from a wide range of areas, we can promote interdisciplinary research, as well as allow doctoral students to experience presenting their work to their colleagues.

Background

The first two symposiums were very successful, attracting submissions from students spread around the world. Both symposiums included talks from distinguished speakers, including Prof. [Brian Randell](#) and Prof. [Maria Petrou](#); all of our speakers have been very enthusiastic about the YDS concept. Students who previously presented their work at YDS found it a useful rehearsal for the "main stage", or a great place to discuss work in progress.

Papers submitted to YDS 2010 are published as a technical report in the Department of Computer Science's [Yellow Report Series](#), and authors are more than welcome to republish extended versions of their work in journals or other conference proceedings.

Scope

The scope of the symposium is intentionally very broad, in order that students from all areas of computer science may benefit from it.

Papers should be no longer than 8 pages and must follow the Springer-Verlag LNCS format, which can be found at <http://www.springer.de/comp/lncs/authors.html>

Paper should be submitted by **July 20, 2010**. For information on submission, please refer to [our submissions page](#).

Submissions will be evaluated by the Program Committee according to their originality, significance, clarity and technical quality.
